**Organized by the LSA Mentoring Program for Women Graduate Students in Nigeria**

#### **Part I**

The women's mentoring network of the Lagos Studies Association was founded to address the ongoing gender imbalances in academia. During the inaugural sessions in 2019, some of the leading women scholars of and from Nigeria narrated their own journeys in academia and created for us an archive of past experiences. Each generation of female scholars face new challenges and must respond to these while also continuing to be research active. The senior scholars in the program serve as role models for the graduate students as they develop competent skills for a sustainable productive academic life.

In addition to meeting with individual mentees, the mentors had two successful interactive sessions with Nigeria-based women scholars at LSA 2019 and organized two highly successful webinars on sexual harassment in higher education in October 2020. LSA 2021, 2022, and 2023 also featured general sessions of the mentors.

In this 2024 session of the LSA Women's Mentoring Program, each mentor will address what we call "Professional Literacy and Academic Citizenship." Each mentor may select one or more topics to address. The intention is to make explicit and to theorize what is required of us in professional settings, rather than to draw on experiential narratives.

What institutional knowledge can empower me to present myself professionally?

What are common mistakes women make that undermine our professionalism?  
How does one say no to tasks that are assigned to you just because you are female (for example making tea in the staff room)?  
How do I navigate different culturally coded settings (for example, how does one express respect in different kinds of rooms and environments)?  
How can I build support networks with other female scholars, where we set time aside for intellectual labor?  
How can I present myself as a professional, and still be fashionable?  
If I am in a co-parenting situation, how can I negotiate to have research time?  
How do I balance being approachable with being professional?  
How can senior female scholars hold the door open for the next generation?

A small campus bungalow in the University of Ìbàdàn has played an outsized role in the life of one man, one family, one university, and the nation. It was in this house on Ebrohimie Road where, sometime in 1967, writer Wólé Şóyínká was arrested after having returned home from a visit to Biafra for a personal intervention in the Nigerian Civil War that was just breaking out. — events already recounted in *The Man Died* (1971), *You Must Set Forth at Dawn* (2006), and other works. It was there, too, that he returned to from jail when he was released 29 months later, after which he went into exile in 1971.

He never returned to Ìbàdàn, choosing to take up a role at the University of Ifè in 1976, where he retired in 1985, a year before winning the Nobel Prize in Literature. "Ebrohimie Road" the

documentary examines how the personal became the national, through the recollection of central and peripheral characters; how a small campus residence became witness to some of the most significant issues in Nigerian social, political, and literary history, many of which remain unresolved. And how ecological changes contribute to the erosion of history and a sense of place. Through stories, visuals, and historical records, we unearth what makes Ebrohimi Road more than just a campus street or physical location, but a place of history and a museum of memory.
